General Strategies for Success:

- Many transferable skills such as analyzing and synthesizing data, research, communication skills and critical thinking are associated with this degree.
- Expertise in ministry can be a plus for secular work environments as well as more traditional ones.
- The undergraduate degree prepares students for professional and graduate study in seminary, business, law, medicine, counseling, higher education and other fields. Be sure to check for prerequisite classes needed to enter various graduate programs.
- Pastoral ministry students can often volunteer in shelters, correctional facilities, nursing homes, or healthcare
 organizations under the supervision of a chaplain. This kind of experience will assist you in discerning career direction.
- Obtaining relevant experience through internships or volunteer experiences is critical to finding employment opportunities. Dual majors or minors can also help open the door in some fields.
- Early in your career you may need to supplement ministry income with other work.
