General Strategies for Success:

- Gain as much experience as possible in a variety of positions to become a well-rounded theatre professional.
- Expand your network to find out about jobs and opportunities.
- Read articles related to theatre to keep up with new developments.
- Work on improving and refining your skills in acting, singing, dancing, design, stage management, directing, etc. through lessons, workshops, classes, or mentorships.
- Volunteer with fundraising efforts for the arts.
- Be aware of scams. Check out the legitimacy of agencies and companies before paying any fees.
- Theatre helps students develop verbal and written communication, public speaking, and teamwork skills. These transferable skills are valued by many types of employers. In particular, positions in sales, marketing, management, and public relations may be open to students with theatre degrees.
