## Northwestern at the Capitol

On March 30 fifty UNW political science and history students participated in Day at the Capitol, an annual event at the Minnesota State Capitol organized by the Minnesota Private College Council. Students received training on policy advocacy and met in small groups with legislators to discuss current bills. The event was

coordinated by Professor Leanna Swanson, who provides instruction in political science and geography and serves as the UNW Social Studies Education Coordinator. President Corbin Hoornbeek, Vice President Greg Johnson, and Dr. Matt Miller, history department chair, also attended. In February Andrew Jantz (\*22) contributed to the Scholars at the Capitol program, with the support of Dr. Adina Kelley, history professor and director of the Eagle Scholars Program. At this event Andrew and students from around Minnesota presented their research projects and demonstrated the quality of education provided by private universities.

- Joshua Weber ('16) has enrolled in the Applied Linguistics and Second Language Acquisition masters program at the University of Oxford.




## **Guest Speakers**

In September our department hosted a number of special events for Constitution Day, an annual opportunity to reflect on the significance of the U.S. Constitution. Our special guest was Dr. Tracy McKenzie from Wheaton

College, a nationally-recognized Christian historian and author who speaks frequently on the need for believers to reflect carefully on the past in order to live faithfully in the present. He spoke to the UNW student body in chapel on the theme "'Right Through Every Human Heart': Human Nature and the Crisis of Democracy." In the evening he presented a lecture to students, faculty, and guests on "We the Fallen People: Redefining Ourselves for a Healthier Democracy."

In April we hosted two historians who met with our students and made engaging presentations. Dr. Robert Elder from Baylor University spoke on "John C. Calhoun: American

Heretic"—Calhoun was one of the most significant US political figures of the 19th century. Dr. Nadya Williams, specialist in ancient history, spoke to our church history class on the topic of her new book, *Cultural Christians in the Early Church: A Historical and Practical Introduction to Christians in the Greco-Roman World*.





### Field Trips!

Recently our department added a new Museum Studies and Public History Minor, which gives our students the opportunity to develop a range of practical skills in these fields. This year we enjoyed a field trip to the Mill City Museum, which was built within the ruins of the Washburn A Mill, the largest and most technologically advanced flour mill in the world when it was completed in the late 1800s. Minneapolis later became the flour milling capital of the world. We enjoyed learning about changes in technology, labor, baking, and marketing, and how this museum interacts with visitors to provide information about Minnesota's past in an engaging way. Dr. Kelley's Digital History, Public History, and Archiving class also had the opportunity to take a behind the scenes tour of the Minnesota History Center in St. Paul. We got to see amazing artifacts such as a Civil War flag carried by Minnesota soldiers at the Battle of Gettysburg and the costume worn by Prince in his Purple Rain video. We also were astounded by the number of manuscripts, documents, and artifacts held by the archives.
